## IMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH, ELCA 2021 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES – Wednesday, January 26, 2022

President Amy Greenwaldt called the 2021 Annual Meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Pastor Megan Clapp welcomed everyone and gave an opening devotion.

Officer's Reports: The 2020 Annual Meeting minutes were accepted as written. President, Treasurer and Financial Review. A motion was made by Kent Schmidt to approve all of the officer's reports and seconded by Jeff Pederson. Motion carried.

Rostered staff reports: Pastor Nate thanked Amy Greenwalt for her leadership during the past year and presented an outgoing gift. Pastor Nate also thanked all outgoing council members, the current staff members, musicians, choir members, and Wednesday worship team. He is thankful for the faithfulness of our congregation in worship and prayer, doing the work of God's people. Pastor Megan echoes the thanks and praise that Pastor Nate mentioned. She is grateful for how Immanuel has embraced new experiments and we will continue to grow and experiment through 2022. Suggestions for continuing to engage: Reach out to one another and make those connections again after time apart. Pastor Megan will celebrate 7 years of ministry at Immanuel this year. 2021 Parochial report: numbers are down but we see thousands of online engagement views. A motion was made by Shaneen Schmidt to approve the rostered reports and seconded by John Pate. Motion carried.

Committee Reports: On page 9 the Worship & Music report corrected David Has to read David Haas. There was no other discussion on Finance, Congregational Life, Property Management, Outreach/Evangelism, Youth or Parish Education reports. A motion was made by Deb Andrews to approve all committee reports and seconded by Shirley Hamre. Motion carried.

Other Reports: There was no discussion or corrections to the Immanuel Church Women, Women's Financials, Lutheran Men's Ministry, Memorials, or Mission Endowment reports.

A motion was made by Ann Pate to approve all other reports and seconded by Shaneen Schmidt. Motion carried.

Synod Report: Letter from Bishop Tesch: Less effort, more Jesus. Did not require a motion

Old Business: No old business.

New Business: Presentation and Adoption of 2022 Budget: Kent Schmidt. Increased 2022 budget about \$5,000.00 from last year, increased benevolence slightly. Programs remained the same. Staff is given a 3% increase across the board. Ended the year with a surplus of \$23,000 to take care of any unforeseen issues through the year. There were no questions regarding the budget report. A motion was made by Rick Johnson to approve the 2022 budget and seconded by Jane Erckenbrack. Motion carried.

Nomination Committee: On Page 23 the ballot is to read 2022 Church Council instead of 2021. There were no nominations from the floor. The council will appoint vacant council positions. A motion was made by Warner Luoma to accept the slate of council members and seconded by John Pate. Motion carried.

Amy Greenwaldt thanked Pastor Nate and Pastor Megan for all the work they did during 2021. Robby Grendahl, the new President, took office and thanked Amy for her leadership during the past year.

The meeting adjourned at 7:10 pm. A motion was made by Margie Anderson and seconded by John Pate. Motion carried.

Pastor Nate closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer.

### REPORT OF THE LEAD PASTOR

To the saints of Immanuel: Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Here we are again. The calendar has flipped, and a new year has dawned, full of opportunity to reflect on the past year and look ahead to what is to come.

2022 had its share of joys. We have seen our Sunday attendance grow a bit and more and more people are feeling better about being in crowds and other families are re-committing themselves to regular worship. We have re-launched our Wednesday worship and education ministry and see steady numbers, including more than 50 youth who are active in that ministry. We started a new "early risers" study group that has had good attendance. And we continue to connect with folks through the radio and our Internet live steam.

2022 was also another year of tremendous generosity. I am especially impressed at how we funded a \$30,000 Grand Piano restoration, a \$44,000 boiler project, were tremendously generous with a variety of community, regional, and global projects, compensated a wonderful staff fairly, funded our mission and ministry, and still ended the year in a tremendously strong financial position. This is a credit to the faithful members and visitors of Immanuel.

2022 was another great year for feeding ministries. Although the community dinner decided to take a break after May, we had a great turnout for the months we were in charge in 2022. And we have seen a tremendous response of volunteers and money for the WDC Backpacks Program. And every month, Immanuel continues to host the MAC/NAPS feeding program and the Senior Frozen Meals Program run by Catholic Charities.

2022 had come challenges, too. Certainly, we were sad to say farewell to our associate pastor – even as we prayed blessings on Pastor Megan in her new call as Senior Pastor at Trinity Lutheran in Detroit Lakes. And we continue to see places where worship could be better attended, where involvement – especially from young families – could be better. And on a personal note, we've seen many people struggle with illness and grief. Even my own family has been touched with health troubles. We are so grateful for the support in the wake of Amsale's cancer diagnosis. And we all hope for the very best results for her treatments in the year ahead.

In the year ahead, I mostly hope that God will provide continued opportunities for us to share the good news of Jesus Christ with those in our community. That Immanuel would be a place of welcome and love. I am confident we can get our staff to "full–strength" in 2023, too – starting with the hire of a full–time Youth, Family, Education, and Spiritual Gifts Coordinator. And I hope you will have time to ponder what specific ministries God is calling you to in 2023? What is your role at Immanuel? How can you share God's love and grow in your own faith? May God guide us and bless us as we seek to be his people in 2023.

## REPORT OF THE WORSHIP & MUSIC COMMITTEE

2022 was a very eventful year for Immanuel, and it was no different for the Worship and Music Committee.

The biggest highlight of 2022 was the Steinway Restoration project. Our Steinway grand piano was built in 1981 in Steinway's New York factory. It was gifted to Immanuel in 1994 in memory of Mangeline "Midge" Forsness, who was tragically killed that year. Being over 40 years old, it was beginning to show its age, especially with as much use as it gets at Immanuel. Lindeblad Piano Restoration of Pinebrook, New Jersey was hired to restore it to its original state. The Steinway began its journey to New Jersey on May 2, 2022. It was evaluated, and with all the restoration needed, it was a \$30,000 project, which is less than half the replacement value. In light of the value of this instrument, which is currently over \$75,000, it was decided to go ahead with this project. This restoration has returned the Steinway piano to what Midge heard the first time she pressed the keys. The Steinway returned to Immanuel on December 18, 2022, just in time for Christmas.

In July of 2022, Susan Thompson donated her Kawai piano to Immanuel. Since we were using piano movers for this transition, we piggy-backed on the opportunity to move several of Immanuel's pianos to different locations within the church; as well as getting two old pianos that were no longer usable, out of the basement. These were taken to the Wadena Transfer Station for disposal. Susan's Kawai piano was used in the Sanctuary for most of the time that the Steinway was away. It has now been relocated to the Fellowship Hall.

Some other highlights of 2022 were:

Holden Prayer Service format was used for Lenten services, and members of the Worship and Music Committee provided the accompanist and led the music portion of the services; started the 9:30 am service in April and continued with this one service throughout the year; brought back several things that had been done pre-Covid such as the passing of the offering plate, singing portions of the liturgies, cantors, etc.; the Sanctuary Choir sang twice a month; the youth choir provided music at some services; Communion continued to be served every Sunday, and the first Wednesday of the month for the Wednesday evening services; Wednesday evening services which started in September are well attended; and an "Emergency" leadership plan has been put in place.

#### Is This as Good as it Gets?

Beloved in Christ of the Northwestern Minnesota Synod,

In the 1997 movie by the same name, a mentally ill character played by Jack Nicholson, wonders aloud to a waiting room full of fellow sufferers, "Maybe this is <u>as good as it gets</u>." Over this last year, I've heard many of you lay and rostered leaders wonder the same thing about our life together as the church in this early part of the 21<sup>st</sup> century as we continue to deal with the lingering effects of the pandemic and the many years of gradual decline in church attendance leading up to it. Although this may not be everyone's reality, we all live among beloved neighbors for whom it is. For many of you, this means, among other things, that you are having to make some hard decisions at this year's annual meetings.

Paul's letters to the Christians in Corinth were written to people who never expected the church to amount to much of anything in this world, and Paul is encouraging them to be good with that. Then, 400 years later, things took an unexpected turn, and for the next 1,400 years or so, the church enjoyed a place of power and prestige in western society. That bygone era yielded mixed results for humankind, for the planet and for the Gospel. But having a big institution with lots of members enjoying great influence over the affairs of this world was never the point; it still isn't.

Consider that being a community of faith that feels its fragility and knows that its place in society is closer to the margins than it is to the center, is a better place from which to practice the way of Jesus – the way of love, service, and humility. There are two things that do not require slick, well-funded programming or big crowds of people, and they happen to be the two most important things: we can share the good news about Jesus Christ, and we can give ourselves, our time, and our possessions to love and serve the neighbors that God has placed among us.

"Will the people come back?" "Will our congregation survive another 5 or 10 years?" These are heartfelt questions that we ask because we cherish these congregations and what they've given us. But these are not Gospel questions. Some Gospel questions might be, "How can we use what we have to grow closer to Jesus?" "With whom can we share the good news, and how will we do it?" "Who needs our love and care, and how will we give it in a Christ-like spirit?" Focusing our life together on these questions costs us nothing – and everything. But what more could there for us be than this, for us who follow Jesus?

Beloved in Christ, thank you for your faithfulness in the Gospel. On behalf of our entire staff, we are grateful for you and for all that you do to share the love of Jesus Christ in the world.

#### REPORT OF THE ENDOWMENT FUND

The Mission Endowment Fund was established in 1996 as a depository for memorials, honorariums, planned gifts, 70 1/2 IRA withdrawals, and as a beneficiary of an estate. The purpose of the Fund is to enhance and extend the mission of Immanuel Lutheran Church apart from the general operation of the congregation. Gifts to the Endowment Fund are invested, not spent. Only the interest is used to further the church's mission. From our income a minimum of 51% will be used for outreach, such as a grant to mission work, ELCA seminaries or colleges or new congregational development. A maximum of 20% will be used for Immanuel's capital improvements, debt reduction or building program. A maximum of 29% may be used for emergency needs such as building repair or replacement of essential equipment.

This year, in addition to \$12,605 of gifts, the fund received a gift of North Dakota farmland, which we sold for the sum of \$125,000. The money is invested in brokered CDs with Ameriprise financial, along with \$10,000 from the funds other assets (\$135,000 total). This money nearly doubles our fund and the impact we will be able to make beginning in 2024. And we were able to make grants from the fund this year, too. The April Giving Blitz, Grand Piano Fund, and WDC Backpacks Program all received sizable grants.

You can be part of this exciting ministry by making a gift of any size to the Endowment Fund in 2023. The congregation is also encouraged to provide ideas, suggestions, and requests for ministry grants.


